









New Hampshire WILDLIFE HABITAT LAND COVER 2010

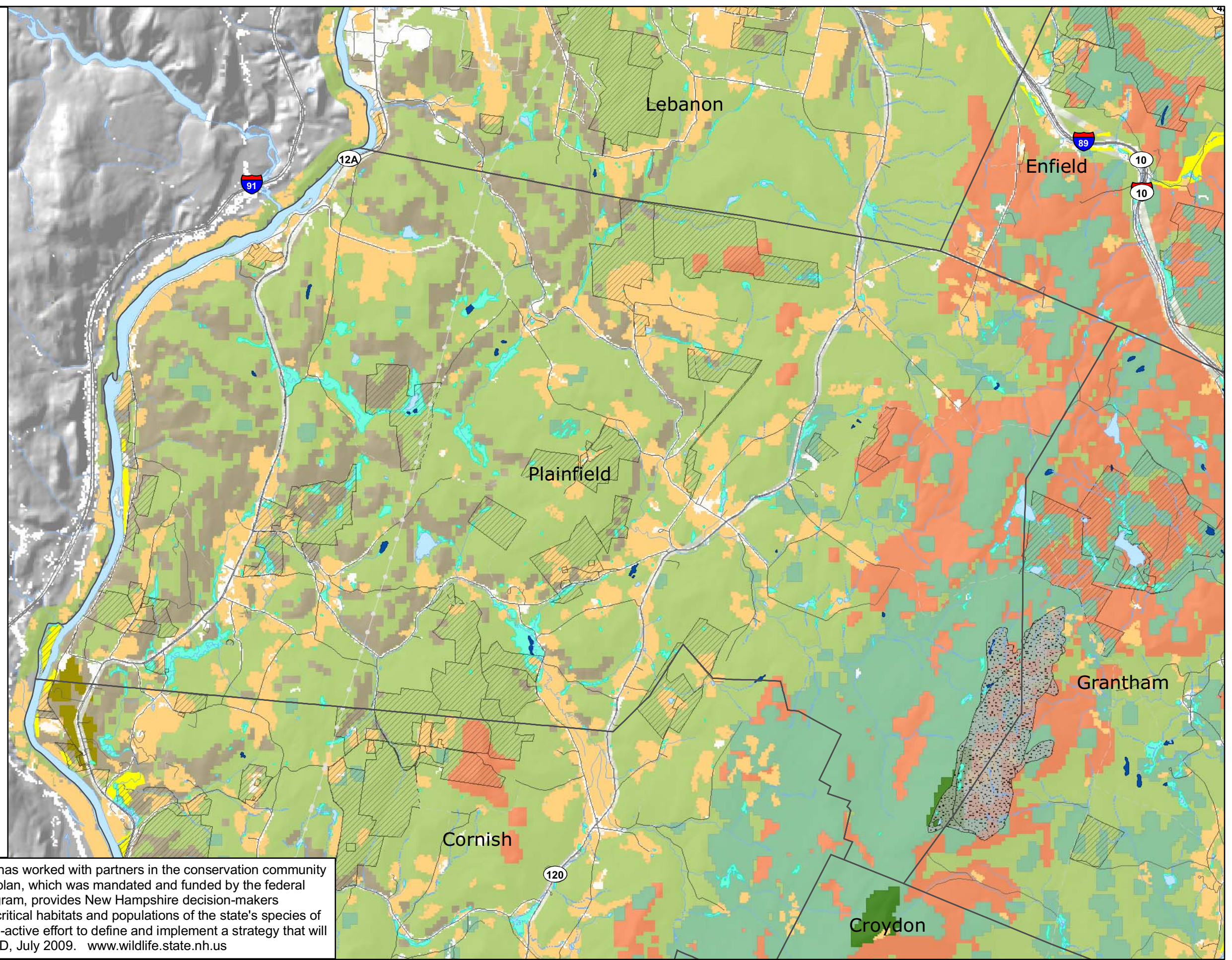

The New Hampshire Fish and Game Department has worked with partners in the conservation community to create the state's first Wildlife Action Plan. The plan, which was mandated and funded by the federal government through the State Wildlife Grants program, provides New Hampshire decision-makers with important tools for restoring and maintaining critical habitats and populations of the state's species of conservation and management concern.
